Public Health and Food Safety Veterinarians

As the One Health initiative continues to gain momentum, the crucial role of veterinarians in public health and food safety is increasingly recognized. Public health issues span across livestock, domestic pets, wildlife, human and environmental health. Veterinarians may be the first to recognize zoonotic diseases before they enter human populations. Animal health may serve as an indicator for environmental health as well as the mental and physical health of human populations.

Veterinarians contribute to public health in many ways. Some veterinarians investigate disease outbreaks in human and animal populations while others treat animals which are part of the food supply. Still other veterinarians treat companion animals and prevent zoonotic disease risks. Many public health veterinarians receive additional training in public health, epidemiology, laboratory animal medicine, food safety, infectious diseases or one of many other disciplines shared between human and veterinary medicine.
